So where do you start?

Here's The Vision Council's guide to selecting readers that will help you power up your vision and your style:

Troubleshoot

Before you think style, you need to know what magnification your reader should be. While trying readers on, hold something book distance (about 14 inches) away from you and once the words are clear you've found the right power. If you aren't sure that you've chosen the right power or if your vision does not become clear when trying on different powers then make sure you go see an eyecare professional. They can help you find the correct power or determine if you may have another vision problem.

Shape Up

Frames should contrast with your face shape, so brush up on your basic geometry. Generally, round faces should wear square or rectangular shapes, square faces should wear rounded shapes, heart faces should wear rimless styles or frames that are wider at the bottom, oblong faces should wear deep frames and oval faces can wear almost anything. Visit with an optician or check out eyecessorize.com to determine your face shape and learn tips on how to find the best frames for your face.

Mind Your Man-ner

Readers come in men's, women's and unisex styles. So how do you make sure you're not picking women's frames? Trust your gut. Stay clear of bright or warm colors, as well as softer, feminine shapes like cat-eyes or almond styles. Unisex styles tend to be round or oval frames, so if choosing these shapes be sure to find a dark color or metal style.

Be the "Eye-T" Guy

If comfort and function are your number one priority, then keep your eye out for technical features that will give you the best fit and quality. Look for spring hinges, scratch resistant lenses and lightweight frames that can withstand your toughest days.

Be Fearless

Choose different options from metal to plastic, geek chic styles to more classic shapes or pops of subtle color to switch up your look.
